Registration

Upon arrival at the Conference venue, please proceed to the Pavilion (Pavilion is located in the Gateway Building), St Antony's College, 62 Woodstock Road Oxford OX2 6JF, to complete the registration. Contact the receptionist at reception in the porter's lodge (it's at the entrance of the College) for directions to the Pavilion. Please note that registration desk will be open from **9.00** am October **27, 2018.**

Please report to Raj (RS Mann, the convenor of PRG) for completing your registration. During the breaks the speakers may also collect their reimbursement for travel to Oxford from within the UK.

Conference Fee: There is a fee of £10 towards attending the conference. The fee can be paid at the time of registration in 'cash'.

Presentation Room: On October 27, we will be using The Pavilion, Gateway Building, St Antony's College, 62 Woodstock Road Oxford OX2 6JF for the presentations (see map attached for directions for the venue, look for Gateway Building for conference venue). You may ask for directions to The Pavilion at the main reception located in the porter's lodge (it's at the entrance of the College).

What should you bring along for your presentation? (this applies to presenters only)

- Please bring the PPT of your research paper in a pen-drive.
- To avoid any inconvenience please save your presentation in your email and google drive as well.
- Please ensure that you save your presentation file MS Office 2016 versions.

- The meeting room has an LCD projector and a computer for you to make your presentation.
- Each author will have 25 minutes for presentation. Kindly stick to the time limits.

Best Presenter Award

Best Presenter Award will be presented to a full time doctoral student whose presentation is judged to be the best from all the doctoral student presentations. A PRG committee will take a decision regarding the best presentation. The award will normally be announced at the end of the conference. The student must be a full-time doctoral student on the date of the conference.

Refreshments

Refreshments will NOT be provided. Please feel free to bring along drinks/food/lunch etcetera. However, it is possible for attendees to eat in the College Hall. The cost is about £10 per person, which can be paid by you in advance or by credit card only on the day. Alternatively, there are some decent sandwich places 5 to 10 minutes away. Also there is a corner shop approximately five minutes' walk from the Pavilion. If there is any change or alternative arrangement, that is more likely to be announced on the day of the conference.

How to reach

From the train station

Taxis are recommended from the station, but if you are happy with a 30 minute walk, turn left as you leave the station area. The Royal Oxford Hotel is directly in front of you; keep left and walk along Hythe Bridge Street. At the end walk straight across into George Street. At the end of George Street the department store Debenhams is on the left. Turn left onto Magdalen Street and walk northwards towards St Giles and Woodstock Road and then follow the instructions given below.

The 14 and 4A bus connecting the railway station to the John Radcliffe (or JR) hospital has a stop very close to the College by Bevington Road. For timetable information, see http://www.stagecoachbus.com/ and search for Oxford in the Location drop-down and 14 and 14A as the Route No./Name (Source: https://www.sant.ox.ac.uk/about-st-antonys/directions-college).

From the city centre

Taxis are recommended from the bus station if you have luggage. To walk from the city centre to St Antony's will take 15-20 minutes. Many local bus stops are located on Magdalen Street (outside the Odeon cinema), and national buses arrive at Gloucester Green Bus Station on George Street. From there you should make your way to Magdalen Street and from there you will reach St Giles'. Keep to the left-hand side of St Giles' and follow the road north. This becomes Woodstock Road eventually when you have passed St Giles' church (on the right) and Brown's Café (on the left). Walk straight up the road, passing the Radcliffe Observatory Quarter and Green Templeton College on the left, until you reach a small group of shops (on the left). The entrance to St Antony's is about 50 metres further up on the right-hand side of https://www.sant.ox.ac.uk/about-stthe road (Source: antonys/directions-college).

You can also get the bus 14 and 14A from Magdalen Street Stop C4 which will drop you at stop named Bevingdon Road, from where the venue is about 4 minutes by walk.

Parking at venue of the conference

The college parking lot can be accessed from Bevington Road. There is no charge but you should let the lodge know you're parked there.
